

The next "Don't Tell Nonnie" is at 7:30 p.m. Sept. 9 at The Sharon, and tickets, which typically sell out fast, are on sale now.

Tickets, which are \$20 and include a free beverage, can be purchased online at the villagesentertainment.com or at any Villages Box Office location.

"Don't Tell Nonnie" takes place at The Sharon every few months, and September's event will be the first of The Sharon's 2019-20 entertainment season.

Whitney usually hosts the event, opening with a song and then handing off the microphone to those who signed up to sing.

"I love the community it has fostered," she said. "We have so many Nonnie regulars. I look forward to seeing them every time. I also really love seeing the talent that shows up. I'm always blown away by what people can do."
