For years, Jan D'Aquisto carried a wedding photo of her and her husband, Tony, to Johnny Mathis concerts, hoping the singer would autograph it.

It seemed their chances

were dwindling.

With their 54th wedding anniversary several months away, the D'Aquistos gave it one more shot when they went to see the famed vocalist Jan. 12 at the Sharon L. Morse Performing Arts Center.

"It was a last-ditch effort," said Tony, of the Village of

St. James.

The framed photo brings two of Jan's loves together: her husband and Mathis' hit single, "Chances Are."

"That song has become a part of me," Jan said.

Jan first heard Mathis' romantic voice sing that ballad in an ice cream shop in Brooklyn, New York. She was 12 at the time. Tony, who happened to be in the same shop, was 16.

Goedken passed on the email to house manager Rebecca Morse, who then told the D'Aquistos she had passed on the request to Mathis' people.

Morse said each performer is different when it comes to

audience requests.

"Some will say they won't do

autographs," she said.

The night of the concert, the D'Aquistos gave Morse the photo, then hoped for the best.

After the show, Morse met the D'Aquistos in the lobby, where she handed them back the photo.

"She said, 'I have a surprise for you," Tony said. "Janet

They saw each other off and on for a few years. In the middle of her senior year, Jan called up Tony and asked him to marry her. Tony, who was serving in the Navy as a medical corpsman, said yes.

In September 1963, Tony and Jan got married during his leave in San Diego. They danced their first dance as a couple to "Chances Are," with Jan's father leading the band.

Jan's neighbor, Joe Goldfeather, got a copy of the sheet music for "Chances Are" and placed a portion of a wedding photo in the center.

Through the years, the D'Aquistos bought several eight-tracks, cassettes and CDs featuring Mathis' music.

They saw Mathis perform in New York, as well as on several occasions in Kissimmee.

All the while, Jan brought the photo with her. One time, the D'Aquistos waited near Mathis' tour bus hoping to see him, but they were asked to

The D'Aquistos, who had moved to The Villages in 2011, wanted to see Mathis when he first performed at The Sharon in January 2016, but by the time Tony sat in front of a computer to look for tickets. the concert was sold out.

This year, Tony got two seats up in the balcony, one in front of the other. Tony ended up sitting in a folding chair when he discovered his seat was missing.
