Fifth-grader John Tyler Wozniak and sixth-grader Peyton Gardner participated in last year's CCD production and couldn't wait to jump in again. This time, Wozniak is playing the Scarecrow and Gardner is playing Dorothy.


Seventh-grader Hayma Win, who plays Jade, one of the Oznians, discovered the play through her friend's mother.

Eighth-grader Clare O'Brien, who plays Davy, a guard monkey, learned about it when her mother found CCD's website.
