It is "difficult to guarantee a free, fair and credible election" in Kenya's fresh presidential vote just eight days away despite "full technical preparedness," the head of the election commission said Wednesday as another wave of uncertainty swept through East Africa's largest economy. Wafula Chebukati spoke hours after a top Kenyan electoral official resigned and fled to the U.S., saying the election on Oct. 26 cannot be free and fair.

Willie Nelson played a little more than an hour to a soldout audience Wednesday night at the Sharon L. Morse Performing Arts Center.

But he and his family band filled that time with a number of songs from his storied catalog, from "On the Road Again" to "Whiskey River" to "Still Not Dead."

Diane Mott, who was sitting in the front row, ended up with one of Nelson's bandanas. She heard Nelson play two of her favorite songs: "Always on My Mind" and "Angel Flying Too Close to the Ground."

"It was very emotional,"

said Mott, who lives in Leesburg. "Every song he sang was fabulous. His voice is like no other, and he's a fabulous guitar player."

At the end, Nelson quickly signed various items at the front of the stage. Wesley Langnecker has Nelson's autograph on a metal Whiskey River sign.

"That's his (signature)," Langnecker said of the squiggle. "We're going to frame it."

He and his wife, Valerie, had seen Nelson at a festival a few years ago from far away; this time they could see him a bit better.

"We are so glad we went," said Valerie, of the Village of Dunedin.
