Churches Continue Uniting City Through Faith

 $The Wildwood\,Unity\,Movement$ began almost two years ago with a commitment by church leaders across denominations and ethnicities to bring the city of Wildwood together.

"We walked down Main Street two years ago at the height of racial tension around the country, determined to make a difference, to bring unity to all residents," said Michael Beck, pastor of Wildwood United Methodist Church.

A Unity Revival held

Wednesday and Thursday evenings at Wildwood United Methodist Church continued the efforts that began with the walk. Members of several congregations provided music, interpretive dance and prayer.

Bishop Tony Jones, pastor of the City Ministries, shared the message Thursday evening.

"These gatherings of people of God are a great way to gain understanding of each other on a more personal basis,' Jones said. "It is good for me to see people from numerous denominations together worshipping God. Everybody brings something different, but we all bring our faith in God."

Regular meetings to continue the work that began two years ago continues, and along the way church leaders added special gatherings to bring members of their more than 10 congregations together. The Unity Revival was the sixth such event

since the movement began.

Maintaining the momentum with so many congregations involved is difficult at times, said Pastor Steve Turner, of Calvary Chapel Villages.

"One of the biggest difficulties is finding a time when all the church leaders can meet on a regular basis," Turner said. "Some of our pastors can't meet during the day, so we're trying evening meetings, even Saturday meetings. It may be difficult, but we have been determined to continue what we've started."

At the end of the Unity Revival, Beck looked back at the event and called it beautiful.

More than 120 people

attended the services each night. "Both nights there was standing room only. All the chairs were filled and people were singing and clapping," Beck said. "It was a spirit-filled event that brought people together in worship."
