How the State Budget Impacts Our Community

Money from Tallahassee will soon trickle into the local area. Gov. Rick Scott signed the state's \$88.7 billion 2018-19 budget March 16. It increases per pupil education funding, creates sales tax holidays and allocates money to fight the opioid crisis and to keep schools safe — all effects local residents will feel. Also tucked into the budget, which starts July 1, are local funding projects ranging from career training to park improvements. Here are some of the budget highlights.



TAX CUTS

Sales Tax Holidays: Scott approved a three-day back-to-school sales tax holiday and week-long disaster preparedness sales tax holiday, saving Floridians \$38.5 million combined.

Commercial Rent Reduction: Commercial rent is falling to 5.7 percent from 5.8 percent. Florida is the only state in the U.S. that levies a tax on commercial rent.



EDUCATION

Per Pupil Funding: The budget includes \$7,408 in K-12 per pupil public education spending. From the 2017-18 year, that's an increase of \$101.

School Safety: Scott OK'd \$344 million for school safety, including money to fund officers in schools, active shooter trainings and access to mental health services.



PUBLIC SAFETY

Opioid Crisis: Scott earmarked more than \$65 million to fight opioids, which includes money for substance abuse treatment, drug monitoring and Naloxone for first responders.

Pay Raises: Law enforcement and first responders will see pay raises. The budget includes \$22.8 million to reward Florida's officers.



VETERANS

Increased Staffing: The Florida Department of Veterans Affairs is receiving \$368,000 to add five claims examiners to assist veterans getting their benefits.

K9s for Warriors: In the budget is \$250,000 to help train service dogs for veterans suffering from PTSD and other stress trauma.



LOCAL PROJECTS

Career Training: Sen. Dennis Baxley, R-Ocala, secured \$866,000 for Leesburg High School to provide students construction career readiness.

Veterans Nursing Home: Baxley also won \$500,000 for a Marion County VA nursing home, which, when finished, will serve surrounding counties.

After the 2018 Legislative Session, Florida Sen. Dennis Baxley, R-Ocala, is back in the district.

Baxley represents District 12, which includes all of Sumter County and parts of Lake and Marion counties. Of his 46 local funding initiatives, 12 of them made it into the final budget.

Baxley was the only elected advocate fighting for local funding this year in the legislature. Rep. Don Hahnfeldt, R-The Villages, died in December.

Scott declined to order a special election for Hahnfeldt's seat, leaving a vacancy in the Florida House of Representatives.

Reflecting on the 2018 Legislative Session, Baxley spoke with the Daily Sun about his accomplishments, unfinished business and hopes for the future.

What Are You Most Proud of Looking Back on the Session?

I'm most proud that we produced a balanced budget, unlike Washington, and that we lived within our means and addressed some major issues: the opioid crisis, the school safety funding and

The last part was perhaps the most impressive.


It seemed as if the whole orchestra had been given a dose of caffeine, playing forcefully and energetically.

Of Your 46 Local Funding Initiatives, 13 Got **Through and One Was Vetoed. What Will These Projects Mean for Your District?**

We're trying to fund things that will facilitate our local governments and nonprofits to accomplish their mission. Everything is really done at home. (Securing local funding is) a very competitive process in a state this large.

What Would You Say Was the Biggest Accomplishment for You in Terms of **Securing Local Funding?**

The one I'm proud of is the (\$866,058) project that we got for Leesburg High School. (Destination Lake: Building a Stronger Community) will improve students' earning power (in construction fields). Trying to find adequate people to do those skilled jobs is challenging. We have a lot of openings in that workforce The Villages has that need ...

We've also been working for a number of years to try to secure the next VA nursing home. I was able to get a commitment of \$500,000 in Marion County, which will effect about eight counties around that will utilize this. We started on this journey, but there are federal things that have to happen, and it will get us in line. Also, the Florida Horse Park project (a \$500,000 project that will include infrastructure improvements and measures to improve the Ocala multipurpose park's hurricane readiness) will have a regional impact. Those are facilities that can be utilized by the entire region, and it will bring dollars and activity into the

Do You Have Any Unfinished Local Business?

My priority for the next two years is to try to do something about our facilities at Lake-Sumter State College. Those buildings are needing some significant repairs. I'm disappointed that I haven't been successful on that front, but this is a very competitive process to get those things that we need done. We have a strong local effort on the ground and we have a lot to be grateful for. I think this is North Central Florida's time.
