Swallow-Tailed Kite Research Mission Ends With a Villages Birder's Help

Bird researchers with the Gainesville-based Avian Research and Conservation Institute had to end a mission tracking a swallow-tailed kite, called MIA, when the battery on its transmitter became low. The institute began tracking the bird in 2012 as part of its research on the migration of swallow-tailed kites, a bird of prey that breeds in Florida and winters in South America. Alice Horst, of the Village of Briar Meadow, used the migration data to find MIA's nest and report on the progress of the bird's chicks. She joined researcher Gina Kent and three helpers to remove the transmitter on May 29. Horst said she was sad that she can't track MIA anymore, but grateful for the work of Kent and the institute for their research.

FIRST THREE MONTHS OF 2018 **BREAK RECORD** FOR TOURISM

The early outlook for tourism in 2018 is a sunny one, as Gov. Rick Scott announced June 5 that Florida welcomed more than 33 million visitors from January to March the largest quarter for visitation in state history. That marks a jump of more than 2 million visitors from the same period in 2017. In a statement, Scott credited the tourism growth with the creation of more than 1.5 million jobs in Florida.
