
ALDI IN LADY LAKE REOPENS AFTER RENOVATIONS


GROUPS WORK TOGETHER FOR WILDWOOD CHILDREN

"The costumes were really good," Peyton said. "The songs were fun and the dances were silly."

Captain Hook will be played by 10-year-old Nora Grogran, of Clermont.

"It's so enlightening," Nora said of the theater camp. "It's fun to be with other kids just goofing around, sometimes very serious, but mostly goofing around.'

Nora's favorite part of the whole experience?

"Being able to scream and no one judges me," she said.

The script includes added characters, dances and songs. Every camper has a part in the show, according to Compass educator Audrey Catalano.

"Our story is really about how the friends of Neverland come together and save their land and fight against the pirates," Catalano said."They also learn about teamwork and collaboration along the way."

One week is not a lot of time to audition, cast, learn and rehearse a full-scale stage production, but the Compass instructors, who travel to a different theater in the country each week, are pros at what

And children are more absorbent than one may think. By Wednesday morning,

the students had learned all of their parts and were in the process of stringing everything together from start to finish, scene by scene.

Children wearing eye patches and mermaid tails pretended to fly across the stage, wood sprites giggled and chanted silly rhymes about Captain Hook and the Lost Boys pretended to be tigers and elephants.

"Most of the students have never done a play before, and giving that experience in a week is kind of like this awesome crash course in theater," Catalano said. "We

from a young age."

It can be scary to be onstage in front of a big crowd, but the Compass educators create a friendly and safe atmosphere during the camp.

Compass provides the lights, costumes, set and props everything needed to put on the show — and Catalano and another educator will be in the show with the children to help them feel empowered and excited to go on stage and do their best.

"We want to impress upon them that theater is a collaborative art form," Catalano said. "Compass' mission statement is stretching creativity and bravery muscles through theater, and that's really what we're trying to do. We want to give them the tools to succeed in ways they might not have tried before."

The show is open to the public. Tickets are \$10 and can be purchased online at thevillagesentertainment.
