RONALD MCDUNALD **CHARITY GETS**

Drugmaker AbbVie is donating \$100 million to Ronald McDonald House Charities, which help provide housing to pediatric patients and their families.

The donation is the single largest-ever gift to Chicago-based charity network. The money will be used to build housing in at least 26 states and at 32 Ronald McDonald Houses.

The network said more than 600 rooms are being added that will allow for 230,000 additional night stays by families with children undergoing hospital treatment.

Tri-County Early Voting Numbers Break Records


Sumter and Marion counties experienced the highest number of voters.

Voting turnouts are breaking records in the tri-county area. Early voting in the Aug. 28 primary election started Saturday for Sumter and Marion counties, and both set single-day records for early voters in a primary election. And both nearly beat those records Monday. Sumter came just six votes shy of the 2,131 ballots cast Saturday. "Our county loves to go out and vote," said Bill Keen, supervisor of elections for Sumter. Marion County welcomed 1,949 early voters Saturday, and another 1,693 Monday. "My hope is that they were extremely interested in the outcome of these elections," said Wesley Wilcox, supervisor of elections for Marion County. "They recognize that their input is essential." Lake County started early voting Thursday and also is seeing an increase. In the first four days, about 3,500 people cast votes, compared to about 2,800 in 2016 and 1,700 in 2014. "We are well ahead of the pace," said Alan Hays, Lake's elections chief. Hays said he appreciates those who take the time to vote early, and he encourages others to take advantage of it.

WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT EARLY VOTING

Early voting in the tri-county area ends Saturday. Until then, polls are open 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. in Sumter, and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. in Lake and Marion. Voters can cast a ballot at any of the early voting locations in their county. Voters must present current and valid photo and signature identification. Two forms of ID may be presented if one has the voter's picture and the other has the voter's signature. Officials encourage voters to take
